


# A Letter from the President

The Lamplighter tells the WHS and Woburn story. In our previous newsletter, we focused our lamp on:


- ~ a prominent, contemporary, local storyteller (John McElhiney);

all this attention. "No way", they said.

I believe that we are, as a culture, recapturing a process as old as language itself where history is transmitted directly from the "maker" to the "taker". The rediscovered phenomenon I'm talking about is "first-person history", where you hear the maker in his or her own words describe what they smelled, saw, heard, felt, thought, said, wrote . . . experienced at the time. This is how history was transmitted before cell phones, internets, TVs, radios, movies, telephones, telegraphs, books, scrolls, clay tablets, etc. and before families routinely scattered to the four winds instead of having three or four generations living within walking distance of each other and the in-laws. When you hear John Lupone describe parachuting onto Normandy in the dark early morning of D-Day, and then surviving his capture, transport and incarceration, now you are talking personal adrenaline. Now, you have a direct connection to what happened. Now, hearing his words, seeing his facial expressions and body language and projecting yourself into his situation, you will remember his experience, connect his experience with the history of that day and maybe even learn something lasting from it.

What a great payoff for the investment of your time! By the same token, your visit to Count Rumford's birthplace in North Woburn (see the interview with the caretaker, Valerie Schmidt) could give you a new appreciation for how humble beginnings might shape great men. Let your imagination take you back and "into the moment".

Westside resident and former Marine **Bob Johnston**, spoke about his engagement in several ferocious battles in Saipan and Iwo Jima and how he witnessed injuries and death to countless other soldiers.

**John Lupone**, a US Army Paratrooper Medic told of his capture during the invasion of Normandy in 1944 and his harrowing experiences during ten months of captivity as a Nazi prisoner of war.

Longtime Woburn resident **Peter Aspesi** gave the large crowd a vivid portrayal of his experience as a machine gunner on a B24 trying to avoid enemy anti-aircraft fire while at times flying just fifty feet above the ground. In one year, Aspesi flew in over 50 such missions.

The final segment featured Woburn native **Mike McGann** who was a tank commander with the 1st Armored Amphibian Battalion in both Guam and Okinawa. He told many stories of death and destruction by Japanese kamikaze pilots, including his own sickness and injury, for which he earned the Purple Heart.

All of the veterans received a standing ovation from the appreciative crowd, many of whom commented how important it is to hear real live personal stories of the

tragedy of war from those who actually experienced it. "This is so much more meaningful than reading about it in a textbook; it truly makes history come alive", commented a young attendee who expressed the hope that this type of program might become an annual Veterans Day event.

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# An Interview with ... Valerie Schmidt

Valerie Schmidt and her husband Peter are the caretakers of the Benjamin Thompson House-Count Rumford Birthplace, located at 90 Elm Street in Woburn. The house is listed on both the List of National Historic Landmarks and the List of National Register of Historic Places.

- Q. Tell us a bit about the history and physical layout of the Rumford
- **A.** The house was built in 1714 and has been in this location ever since. There are eight rooms, four of which are open for public viewing. Everything has been carefully preserved, giving visitors a true glimpse into pre-revolutionary life in Woburn.
- **Q.** How did you happen to become caretaker?
- A. Back in 1976, my father answered a small newspaper ad thinking the position might be of interest to him. When he realized what was involved, he declined and suggested that as newlyweds, it might be a good 'starter' situation for my husband and me. Thirty-one years, two children, and one grandchild later, we are still here and enjoying every minute of it.

- **Q.** What are your duties and responsibilities?
- A. Basically to keep the home clean and neat, the grounds landscaped, and to make recommendations to the governing body concerning maintenance, etc. I conduct tours every weekend for anyone who happens to stop by. Visitors come from the world over, including Germany, Australia, and one from Korea who came specifically to see this house. Some have studied the history of the home and like to explore independently, while others prefer a narrated tour. Some are most interested in the house itself; others are familiar with Thompson's work as an inventor and scientist, and appreciate his contributions to the study of heat exchange and physics.
- **Q.** Do you charge an admission fee? Otherwise how is the Rumford House supported financially?
- A. There is never a charge for admission. Anyone is free to come by between 1:00 and 4:00 p.m. on any Saturday or Sunday afternoon. Financial support comes from the Rumford Historical Association, chaired by Woburnite Len Harmon. The Association receives no public funds, other than an occasional grant that the Rumford Historical Association must match.
- **Q.** What are the greatest challenges facing you and the governing body in 2007?
- **A.** As with any aging structure, upkeep is a struggle, and there never seems to be enough money to keep up with the constant maintenance requirements. We'd also love to attract more visitors, particularly school children so that present and future generations can develop a greater appreciation for Woburn's rich history.

Benjamin Thompson's birthplace contains reconstructed models of Count Rumford's scientific experiments and inventions. Also on display is a copy of a portrait of Count Rumford by Thomas Gainsborough and a library of Rumford biographies and essays.

Its governing body, the Rumford Historical Association, was founded on March 26, 1877 for the purpose of maintaining the birthplace of Benjamin Thompson as a site of historic interest.

Tours are conducted on most weekends between 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

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# Woburn Historical Society's Past Programs

Since its inception, the WHS has offered a wide variety of programs, from Revolutionary War reenactments to interviews with WWII veterans, to inform and entertain our members and the public. Here is a summary of our past programs:

**March 2006** Our very first meeting was attended by over 70 people and after introductory remarks by President Pro-Tem Cary Scarborough, the group was treated to a tour of the historic First Congregational Church, which turned out to be the site of many of our future meetings.

**April 2006** Vice President Pro-Tem and Genealogy expert Kathy Lucero led us on a detailed explanation of various resources available to anyone interested in researching his or her individual family history, something most of us needed to know in order to get started.

May 2006 The historic Tocci building hidden in Central Square and the history of the world-renowned Gustavino Tile Works once located in that building were featured in a video presentation by current building owner John Tocci and Amy West.

**June 2006** Civil War author Richard Griffin held us spellbound as he related stories of several Woburn young men who fought during the War Between the States, some of whom never returned home.

**July 2006** On this warm summer evening, local attorney and historian John McElhiney led us on a tour of the various Woburn Common monuments, reminding us of the immense sacrifices made by Woburn men and women in times of war.

**September 2006** Members Walt Kearney, Leon Basile, Darlene Wigton and Joe Brown conducted an informative workshop on using modern technology to preserve and restore precious old photographs that might otherwise be lost or destroyed.

October 2006 Our largest crowd of over 300 attended the first annual tour of the newly renovated and rededicated First Burial Grounds on Park Street, one of the nation's oldest cemeteries.

**November 2006** Continuing on the theme of the September meeting, Brian Ouellette and Rob Carbone demonstrated for us the techniques used in converting old 8mm and 16mm motion picture film into modern DVD.

**December 2006** The new function room at the Greek Orthodox Church was the site of the Society's first annual holiday party hosted by members Kathy Lucero and Melissa Davidson-Kyle and included a narrated tour of the church's sanctuary.

**January 2007** Appropriate to our meeting location at the First Congregational Church, stained glass expert Dan Maher fascinated all of us with an interesting and lively detailed history of the stained glass industry.

**February 2007** What better way to spend a cold winter evening than to relive our days spent at old Revere Beach and Foley Beach at Horn Pond which over 150 of us did during Bob Upton and Kathy Lucero's pictorial presentations.

March 2007 Our fledging organization held its first annual meeting and elected a slate of officers and directors. We also learned about the Haverhill Historical Society from its director, Brenna Langenau.

**April 2007** Despite being rained out twice, "Pathways of the Patriots", a reenactment of Woburn's role in the early stages of the Revolutionary War, was an enormous success with over 500 in attendance at old Battle Road off Russell Street.

May 2007 Astronaut Dr. Al Sacco landed at the new Woburn Memorial High School auditorium and took us on a celestial journey with sounds and sights taken aboard his orbiting space shuttle.

**June 2007** Heimlich Nurseries graciously allowed use of their greenhouse as we took a trip back in time, viewing photographs and hearing stories of the many family farms that once dotted the Woburn landscape.

**September 2007** Society member Sue Ellen Holland and Tom Doyle of the Woburn Public Library took us on a pictorial journey back to Woburn Center in the 1950's. We were delighted to see so many stores and businesses that once were the backbone of a thriving downtown.

October, 2007 Our second annual tour of the Olde Burial Ground was even better than last year with a much larger crowd, new actors, new stories and the appearance of two gigantic live oxen at Citizens Park.

**November, 2007** During a well attended event hosted by Vice-President Kathy Lucero, four of Woburn's WWII veterans shared their fascinating stories of peril and pride in serving their country, presented by both an oral history film and live commentary.

**December, 2007** In spite of inclement weather, the 2nd Annual Holiday Party, hosted by Board members Kathy Lucero and Melissa Davidson-Kyle, was a merry way to usher in the holiday season with good food and good wishes for all.

## Olde Burial Ground Tour

Over 300 people attended and enjoyed Woburn Historical Society's 2<sup>nd</sup> annual tour of the Olde Burial Grounds on Park Street on October 20, 2007. Tour guides Ray Drapeau, Jim Dwyer, Joanna Gonsalves, Sue Ellen Holland, and John McElhiney provided general information about the cemetery and those buried there, and led attendees to five stations where entertaining stories about Woburn in the 18<sup>th</sup> century were performed by the Society's Living History Guild.

The program began at Citizens Park with the story of Simeon Reed, a farmer who traded his wife for a team of oxen. Actors Ann Catania, Chris Hurley, Chuck Provost and Carol Seitz were accompanied by two enormous live oxen, Tanner and Nick, brought from Connecticut by their owners, Richard and Jane Smith.

At the cemetery, Town Matriarch Mary Richardson Fowle (played by Judy Cataldo) related stories to her daughters Mary and Abigail (Victoria Coots and Logan Young) of the harsh and difficult times faced by Woburn residents in the town's early years.

In another scene Loammi Baldwin (Tom Coots) defended his friend Benjamin Thompson (Dirk Mahling) against an unruly mob taking its anger out on the British loyalist. The mob leader, Ebenezer Mackintosh (Kim Carrell), confronted Thompson's mother (Lois Surrette), who boldly protected her son.

Another story involved Magistrate Josiah Johnson (Ron Sullman) who was asked to rule on the marital status and property of Ichabod Richardson (Charles Linskey) and Sarah Wyman Richardson (Robin Longendyke) following Ichabod's return to Woburn after being assumed dead for over seven years. Sarah was accompanied to court by stepdaughter Betsey (Alex Longendyke).

The final cemetery scene took place inside the Ark Tavern, Woburn's first "spirits" store where Phebe Walker Richardson (Clare Hurley) and two travelers played by Lincoln Clark III and Darlene Wigton were greeted by Samuel Walker (Joe Brown) who turned out to be a real "spirit" (a ghost from the past).

Society member Walt Kearney produced the tours and described the event as "extremely successful" because of the time and dedication of the scores of volunteers who participated in the program "I'd like to credit them all by name, but I'd be afraid of forgetting someone, so I will just give a public 'Thank You' to them all," Walt concluded.

Following the narrated tour, Kathy Lucero and Melissa Kyle-Davidson served refreshments at the First Baptist Church. They displayed various types of gravestone "art" that could be found on head stones in the cemetery, scrapbooks containing articles and photos of past WHS events, and information on the upcoming Woburn's Veterans of WWII presentation. All agreed that the afternoon turned out to be a fun and informative learning experience.

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#### Veterans and the YouTube Generation to Meet in the Classroom

Kathy Lucero and the four veterans featured in November's meeting will present this same program to several history classes at Woburn Memorial High School in January 2008. Presenting to high school students achieves one of the society's overarching goals: to make local history come alive in a meaningful way for the city's students.
